Definitions

- Data Governance The execution and enforcement of authority over data.
- Data Stewardship Formal accountability for data.
- Data Steward A person held formally accountable for their relationship to the data.
- Metadata Data that improves both the business and technical understanding of the data.
- Metadata Governance The execution and enforcement of authority over metadata.
- Metadata Steward A person held formally accountable for their relationship to the metadata.






- 1. A Data Steward Can Be Anybody
 - Data Steward A person held *formally accountable* for their relationship to the data.
 - Anybody = Everybody
 - Everybody is a Data Steward
 - People do not recognize themselves as Data Stewards. Help them!
 - This rule is very practical and changes the data culture. Become literate!







- 2. Data Stewardship Describes a Relationship to Data and Is Not a Position
 - Since anybody can be a Data Steward ... It is silly to give them all the same title.
 - Relationship Equates to Action
 - The actions people can take with data include:
 - Define Data
 - Produce Data
 - Use Data








- 3. A Data Steward Is Not Hired to Be a Data Steward
 - Experience Matters
 - New hires will not know the data like the people you already have in your organization.
 - Being a Data Steward becomes automatic if they have a relationship to data.
 - Being a Data Steward somewhere else helps ... but doesn't mean they know your
 - When a person is hired ... and they have a relationship to data ... they become a steward.
 - So, I guess ... Data Stewards are hired ... just not specifically as Data Stewards.



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
- 4. A Data Steward Does Not Need the Title of Data Steward
 - Since everybody is a Data Steward ... everybody cannot have the same title.
 - In fact, ... you do not have to call people "Data Stewards" for them to be Data Stewards.
 - Being a Data Steward focuses on having a relationship to data.
 - And being held formally accountable for that relationship.
 - Know who your Data Stewards are.





- 5. A Data Steward Does Not Have to Be Told How to Do Their Job
 - It is not up to Data Governance to tell businesspeople how to do what they do.
 - Data Governance shares guidelines and rules that must be followed around what people do.
 - It is up to the Data Steward's management to instruct people how to do their jobs.
 - It is up to the Data Steward's management to evaluate how people do their jobs.
 - Data Governance does not have the authority over the Data Stewards.
 - Data Governance can highlight when people are not following guidelines and rules.





- 6. Public or Industry Data Steward Certification Is a Load of Bunk
 - People's activities are specific to the way things are done at your organization.
 - Steward responsibilities are not the same organization to organization.
 - There are several levels of Data Stewards.
 - Can people be certified by someone else in how to do their job?






- 7. More Than One Data Steward Exists for Each Data Type
 - Stewards are people held formally accountable for their relationship to data.
 - Multiple people define, produce, and use the same data.
 - There are multiple levels of Data Stewards Operational and Tactical.
 - Operational stewards are active within their business unit.
 - Tactical stewards are accountable for data across business units.








- 8. Data Steward Training Should Focus on Formalizing Accountability
 - Formalizing accountability for the actions people take with data at your organization.
 - Formalizing accountability for how people define data when they define data.
 - Formalizing accountability for how people produce data when they produce data.
 - Formalizing accountability for how people use data when they use data.



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- Because they make sense.
- Because the only way to cover the entire organization is to follow the rules.
- Because it makes it easier to recognize people as stewards.
- Recognizing stewards is less invasive than assigning people to be Data Stewards.
- Because getting stewards to recognize themselves as stewards is a big win.





- Because they make sense.
 - Practical and do-able.
 - At risk if some other action is taken. Like assigning people to be data stewards.
 - How else will you cover the entire organization?
 - Because the rules are non-invasive. And people like things that are non-invasive.



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- Because the only way to cover the entire organization is to follow the rules.
 - Assigning Data Stewards may not be acceptable.
 - Identifying Data Stewards may not be effective.
 - Recognizing Data Stewards assures that everybody active with data is accountable.
 - Everybody is a Data Steward; Get Over It. 1/3/18 TDAN.com





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- Because it makes it easier to recognize people as stewards.
 - Recognizing people into roles is the natural way of determining who your stewards are.
 - The positive nature of being recognized for something.
 - Not giving people accountability that they don't already (supposedly) have.
 - People cannot opt-out of being recognized as a steward.



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- Recognizing stewards is less invasive than assigning people to be Data Stewards.
 - Acceptable reaction to being recognized versus being assigned or identified.
 - Formalizing behavior requires less resources.
 - Recognition can be scary if not explained appropriately.
 - Start and stay non-invasive.







- Because getting stewards to recognize themselves as stewards is a big win.
 - Recognition is great but self-recognition is even better.
 - Emphasize the raises that come from being a Data Stewards.
 - Data Governance is a game that you win by building stewarding into daily activities.
 - Getting stewards to take their role seriously and actively engage is the biggest win.





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- They must be defined by you.
- They must be able to be operationalized by you.
- They must be communicated and sold by you.
- They must be approved by your leadership.





- They must be defined by you.
 - Defined by program administration.
 - Approved by program leadership.
 - Shared with program participants.
 - Enforced by program execution.





- They must be able to be operationalized by you.
 - Built into existing projects.
 - Built into existing programs.
 - Built into new or existing investments.
 - Built into project management as a partner.
 - Engage Data Stewards to do your "dirty work".






- They must be communicated and sold by you.
 - Theory of everybody being a steward must be consistent.
 - Getting people to sign-on as Data Stewards through execution.
 - If people don't want to be (or reject being) recognized as stewards ... That's okay!
 - Most people will agree that they are stewards until it feels like work they don't want to do.




- They must be approved by your leadership.
 - People who define data are approved.
 - People who produce data are approved.
 - People who use data are approved.
 - These people are Data Stewards if they are held formally accountable.
 - Everybody is (approved as) a Data Steward Get Over It!





- Recognize people as Data Stewards.
- Get people to recognize themselves as Data Stewards.
- Record the people as Data Stewards.
- Onboard people as Data Stewards.
- Engage people as Data Stewards.






- Recognize people as Data Stewards.
 - Pick an issue or opportunity.
 - Pick a project.
 - Pick a subject area (domain).
 - Pick a part of the organization.
 - Pick a champion (or two or ... six).







- Get people to recognize themselves as Data Stewards.
 - Use every business and technical meeting as an opportunity ...
 - Conversations lead to data that they know about.
 - Determine their relationship to the data SME for business? data? definer, producer, user?
 - Ask them if it is okay for you to ask them questions.
 - Expect a "yes" response.
 - Acknowledge that they are a steward. ---- "well, yes, I guess, I am a steward."







- Record the people as Data Stewards.
 - Business Stewards vs Business Data Stewards.
 - (Formally) Document the people that define, produce, and use data.
 - Document the data they define, produce, and use. Use a Common Data Matrix.
 - Document the people that are the subject matter experts, authorities and decision-makers.
 - Make that information available to people.




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- Onboard people as Data Stewards.
 - Don't expect Data Stewards to know how to do "Data Steward stuff".
 - Being a steward is a new concept to many people. Explain it well.
 - Help them to look for ways to engage and add value.
 - Provide them with an enabling toolkit.
 - Be there to answer *their* questions.
 - Provide formal education, training, and tools.

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In part one of this column, I wrote about how organizations engage their data stewards as part of their formal data governance program. I mentioned that the data stewards do not always know how to behave as formal stewards. Data governance programs must focus on engaging and empowering the organization's data stewards in order to be successful. The data will not govern itself and requires an








How the Rules Add Business and Technical Value

- They cover the entire organization.
- They do not assign people anything.
- They do formalize accountability for data.
- They aim to engage the "right" people at the "right" time.






- They cover the entire organization.
 - Assigning people as Data Stewards will not cover the entire organization.
 - Identifying people as Data Stewards will not cover the entire organization.
 - Recognizing people as Data Stewards will not cover the entire organization ... until ...
 - People recognize themselves as Data Stewards.
 - Following the rules for becoming a data steward will cover the entire organization.



- They do not assign people anything.
 - People already have day jobs.
 - People already are overburdened and stretched extremely thin.
 - Reason for this <u>↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑↑</u>
 - If you make their life more challenging people will rebel.
 - Assigning people to be stewards doesn't work.








is because of data.

- They do formalize accountability for data.
 - People are already accountable for specific actions.
 - People are not necessarily held formally accountable.
 - Being held formally accountable requires that people know what accountability looks like.
 - Being held formally accountable requires that there are consequences for behavior.
 - Data Governance is the execution and enforcement of authority. Accountability?



- They aim to engage the "right" people at the "right" time.
 - The Data Governance Bill of "Rights".
 - It is what Data Governance is all about.
 - You have won the Data Governance game when stewards actions become built in.
 - Follow the rules for becoming Data Stewards ... and business and technical value will follow.
 - Everybody is a Data Steward; Get Over It!
 - The Data Will Not Govern Itself.
