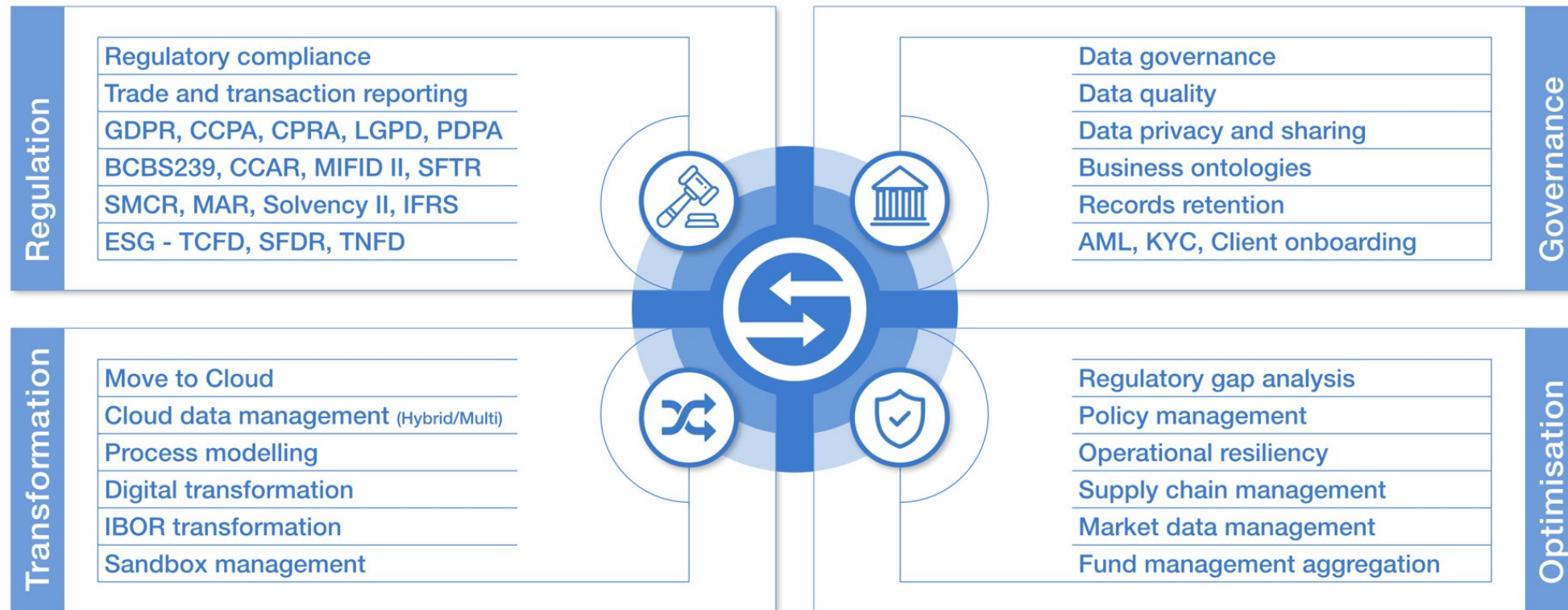

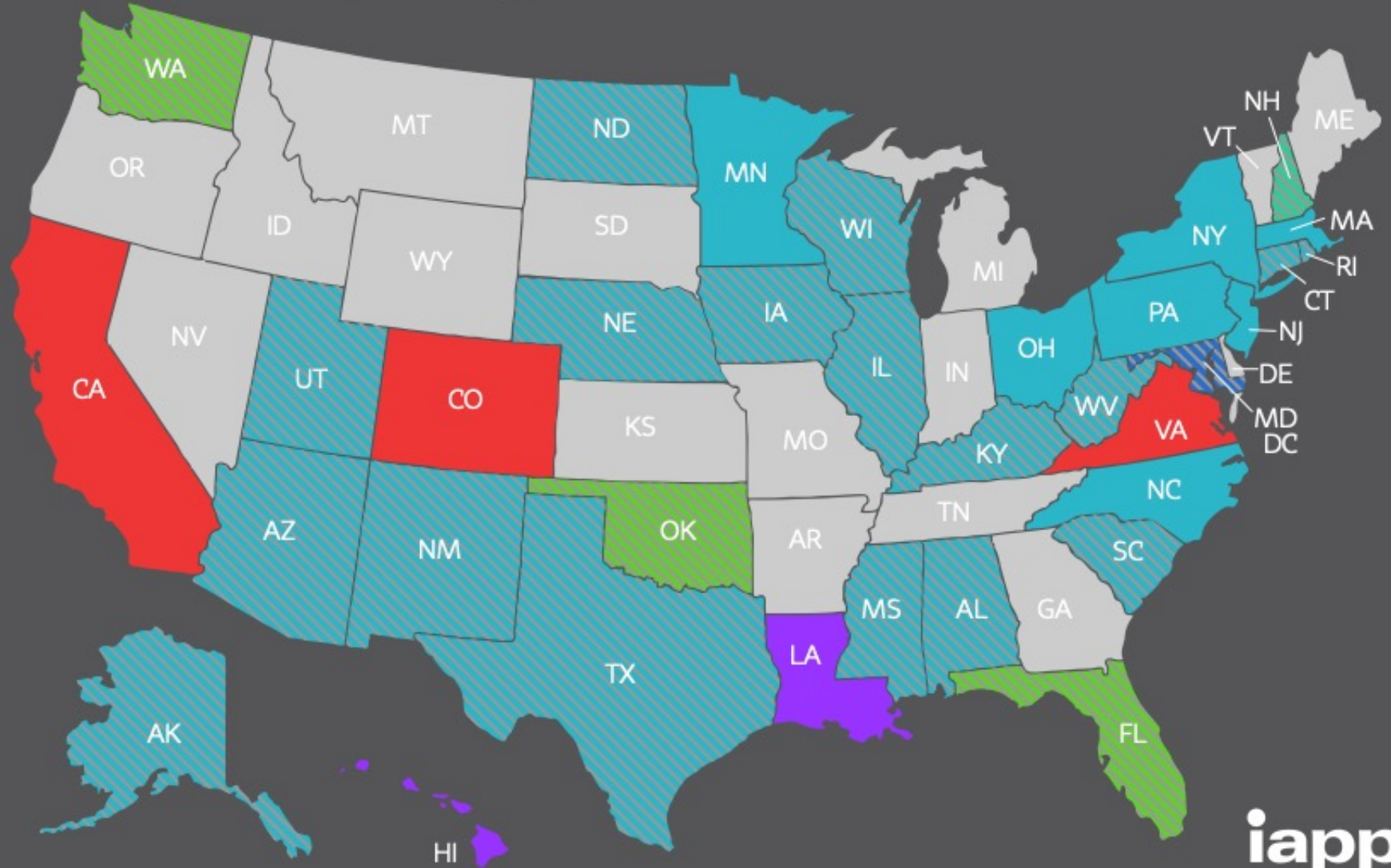
US State Privacy Legislation Tracker

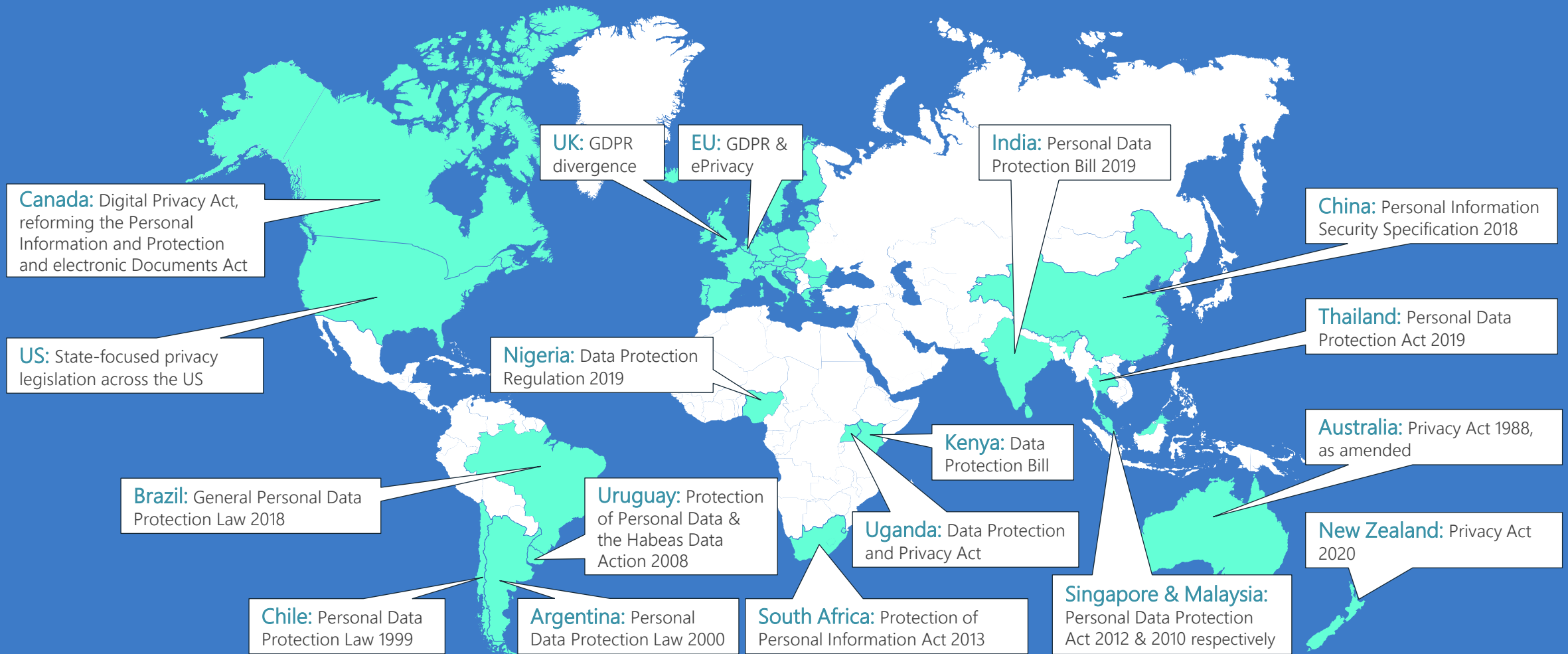
